Looking Ahead - At the Movies

When something unexpected happens, our instinct is to *do something* ... *anything!* A problem pops up, and we rush in to fix it. We want to prove we're capable, strong, and needed. But sometimes, even with the best intentions, our quick reactions cause more harm than good.

Proverbs 14:12 reminds us, "There is a path before each person that seems right, but it ends in death."

It's a sobering truth: what *feels* right in the moment isn't always *wise*. Our desire to solve things quickly can cloud our ability to see clearly. Often, we jump to conclusions, speak too soon, or take action before we've paused long enough to seek God's direction.

In action movies, agents leap at the first sign of a crisis. But, when we are facing our own dilemmas, the better move might be to *pause*, take a breath, pray, and invite others in to help us discern the best next step.

Maybe today you're facing something that demands a response. Before rushing in, pause and ask God to show you the right path. Odds are, he'll guide you toward peace and clarity instead of panic and chaos.

Discussion Questions:

Ice Breaker: What's something a friend, neighbor, or family member has helped you with that you couldn't have done as easily on your own?

How do you see your community responding to the needs of people who are going through a crisis?

Read Ecclesiastes 4:9-12: How can sharing life with others help us learn essential life skills like caring, trusting, and loving?

What qualities do you look for in a friend?

Reflect and Respond: How might you take steps toward finding or becoming that kind of 'back-to-back' friend described in Ecclesiastes 4:12?

Lord, when life feels urgent and uncertain, help me to pause before reacting. Give me wisdom to see what's truly right, not just what feels right in the moment. Teach me to trust your voice above my impulses, and remind me that I don't have to face any crisis alone. Amen.

New Testament Reading Plan: Revelation 17

Ecclesiastes 4:9-12

Two people are better off than one, for they can help each other succeed. ... A person standing alone can be attacked and defeated, but two can stand back-to-back and conquer...

There's a part of me that still believes I have to handle things on my own. Maybe it's because for so many years, I did. When life got hard, my default was to double down. I put my head down, pushed through, and kept it all to myself. It felt safer that way. No one could disappoint me or misunderstand me if I just carried it alone. But somewhere along the way, that independence became isolation. And isolation is a heavy place to live.

God never intended for us to walk through life that way. Ecclesiastes 4 reminds us that "two are better than one." Friendship is more than just companionship. It is a divine design. It's God's way of helping us see what we can't see, feel what we've forgotten, and believe what we've stopped believing. True friends hold us up when our strength gives out, speak truth when lies feel louder, and remind us that we're not fighting alone.

I can think of moments when my Christian friends saw the exhaustion I tried to hide behind a smile. They didn't try to fix me or tell me to "just have faith." They showed up. They listened. They prayed. And in their presence, I felt the presence of God. It reminds me that love isn't meant to stay locked inside our own walls.

When we let people in, we let God's love move through them. It takes humility to admit we need others. It takes courage to be seen. But that's where strength is found. We have a triple-braided cord of community, friendship, and faith.

Alone, we can survive for a while. Together, we can conquer.

Don't do life alone. Reach out to someone. Ask for prayer. Check on a friend who's been quiet. The gift of friendship isn't just about having someone by your side. This gift is about becoming the kind of friend who helps others stand strong each time they fall. Because together, we're better. Together, we reflect the heart of God to all around us, especially those who are just getting to know him.

Questions:

When life feels heavy, do you tend to reach out for help or pull away and handle things on your own? Why do you think that is?

Who in your life helps you see what you can't see - someone who speaks truth and reminds you of God's promises when you forget them?

What might it look like for you to be that kind of friend to someone else this week?

Next Steps:

As we approach the holiday season, a time that can magnify both joy and loneliness, take a moment to reach out to one person who might be struggling. Send a text, write a card, drop off coffee, invite them to attend your Group, or simply check in. Remind them they're not alone and that they matter. Small gestures can carry eternal weight when offered with genuine love.

Father, thank you for creating us to live in connection with you and with others. Forgive me for the times I've tried to handle life alone. Teach me to see friendship the way you designed it: as a source of strength, truth, and grace.

Help me notice those who are hurting around me, especially as the holidays draw near. Give me courage to reach out, to listen, and to love without expectation. And when I feel weak, surround me with people who remind me of your faithfulness.

Thank you for the gift of friendship and the reminder that a cord of three strands - you, me, and others - is not easily broken. In Jesus' name, amen.

New Testament Reading Plan: Revelation 18

Have you ever struggled with self worth?

Personally, I've found this to be a recurring problem. I am a people pleaser, just wanting to make everyone happy. Unfortunately, I have learned the hard way that no matter what I do, I can't please everyone. And yet, at times, I still get caught up in a vicious cycle trying to. Not only is it exhausting, but it's not how God wired us to live.

We must remember where our worth truly comes from.

Our worth does not come from our actions - it comes only from God and who he says we are: loved, transformed, forgiven. We must break the cycle of trying to be good enough and give up control of our lives. A misguided sense of control only causes anxiety and distress, because we are focusing on the wrong things.

Even though there is absolutely nothing we can do to deserve God's love, he still loves us and wants to spend eternity with all of us! He does not care if we are rich or popular - each of us matters the exact same to him. So we no longer have to compare ourselves to others or feel bad about ourselves, because in our Creator's eyes, we are beautiful.

God intentionally created each of us with a unique purpose and spiritual gifts. He intended for all of us to be different. We were never meant to be identical clones, looking and acting the same - we are all "fearfully and wonderfully made" (NIV Psalm 139:14).

This week, intentionally rest in God's peace and meditate on who he says you are. Give up control of what others think and stop letting the world determine your self worth. The Creator of the universe adores you, and there is nothing anyone can do to change that!

Psalm 8:3-5

When I look at the night sky and see the work of your fingers - the moon and the stars you set in place - what are mere mortals that you should think about them, human beings that you should care for them? Yet you made them only a little lower than God and crowned them with glory and honor.

Questions:

How is your self-worth right now?

What are some ways that you can remind yourself of who God says you are?

Next Steps:

Get baptized to publicly die to your old self and be dedicated to your new life in Christ (Romans 6:4).

New Testament Reading Plan: Revelation 19

New Testament Reading Plan: Revelation 20

It's all vanity.

At least according to Solomon, the wealthiest and wisest man alive at the time he wrote the Book of Ecclesiastes.

Ecclesiastes 6:9 (ESV)

Better is the sight of the eyes than the wandering of the appetite: this also is **vanity** and a striving after wind (emphasis added).

All is vain - what does that even mean?

It means it's useless. There's no purpose or reason for what you have, or for chasing things that don't completely satisfy you. It means that the *things of this world* will never lead you to the contentment you are looking for.

Last weekend, during *At the Movies*, we were introduced to Thelma, a 94-year-old woman. She must have gone to great lengths to store up money, hiding it around her house. But when she received a fraudulent call that her

grandson was in trouble, she jumped into action, wanting to be helpful, and ended up the victim of a scam.

I don't know about you, but I would have been tempted to "borrow" a scooter and charge ahead to get my \$10,000 back, too. (You go, Grandma Thelma!)

Although I don't have that kind of cash hidden around my house, I have other things I value, like my mug collection. I wouldn't want it lost or stolen. And isn't that what we often think life's all about ... things?

We want more. We want what's next or better. It's easy to get caught up dreaming about what's next - more stuff, more success, new or different relationships. And when we don't get it, it's not fair. We feel like we've been robbed and cheated.

Friends, I'm here to tell you that kind of chasing never satisfies.

Fortunately for our character, Thelma, her efforts were not all in vain. She risked her health, well-being, and emotional stability to chase after what she didn't have, but along the way, she discovered that friendship and family are things she could never lose.

Let's receive this lesson, too. Instead of exhausting ourselves, chasing the wind for all we don't have, let's slow down and appreciate the people and blessings God has already placed in our lives.

Ecclesiastes 6:9 (NLT)

Enjoy what you have rather than desiring what you don't have. Just dreaming about nice things is meaningless - like chasing the wind.

Questions:

What is something that is hard for you to be grateful for? Why?

What is something you have been striving for?

What is one thing you can do this week to slow down and find contentment?

Next Steps:

Donate something that is no longer of service to you.

Seek out someone you haven't connected with in a while and spend quality time with them.

Write down three things you are grateful for in the *Daily* gratitude area in the CedarCreek App.

Prayer:

God, I pray for contentment. I want to live with gratitude. I am dissatisfied about (blank), and because of that, I have been chasing after the wind. The things I have been pursuing that are not satisfying me are not from you, and I pray that they will fall away. Lead me to contentment in you and this beautiful life you have given me. Show me an area where I need to ask for help and help me to invite people in so that I am not living life alone. Amen.

New Testament Reading Plan: Revelation 21
