Looking Ahead - 5.5.2024 - Losing My Religion

If you were teaching a child how to respond when receiving a gift, would you encourage them to try to earn it, or to simply respond with gratitude and thankfulness?

So often, we think we have to earn God's love and approval—his *grace*—but scripture reminds us that it is a gift.

Ephesians 2:8

God saved you by his grace when you believed. And you can't take credit for this; it is a gift from God.

As we receive this gift and realize how precious it is, our lives will begin to look different. How could they not? Such a gracious gift will leave us wanting to live in immense gratitude and shape our actions because we know we received something we didn't deserve.

So as we conclude this series, take some time to consider how you view the Father. Is he someone who is demanding and angry, or is he someone who lavishly pours out undeserved grace and mercy if we only accept it?

Finally, consider recording your responses in a journal, whether digital or hard copy. It's a great way to be able to look back on the adventure God has you on.

Prayer:

Lord, I am not worthy of your love, and there is nothing I can do to earn the grace and mercy you offer me. Yet, Jesus willingly died as an offering for my sin. Help me accept this precious gift and live from it. Let my life shine as an example of your great love, so others may come to know you. In Jesus' name, amen.

Discussion Questions:

Icebreaker: Share a time when someone showed you unexpected grace.

How can you live from a place of grace?

Jesus as Lord and Savior - Losing My Religion

May 6, 2024

Can you remember a time in your life when a parent or adult shamed you? Maybe you begged and begged, hoping they would find favor with you instead of taking something away, criticizing you, or making you feel insignificant. Perhaps you would have done anything to avoid feeling that shame again.

We tend to view our relationship with our Heavenly Father in a similar way. We feel shame about the things we've done and don't want God to be disappointed or punish us. The burden becomes so heavy that it leads us away from God, or even prevents us from seeking him for the first time.

This religious game is based on our misconceptions about what God wants from us, but his grace doesn't work that way. It frees us from playing the game altogether. Grace is a gift that we don't deserve—a favor from God. Not because we have done enough good for God to like us, but

because God created us and wants a relationship with us, his beloved children.

This is the Good News and the hope that we have as Christians. We cannot save ourselves. It is only through Jesus' death and resurrection that we can come to the Father and experience his grace.

Ephesians 2:8-9

⁸ God saved you by his grace when you believed. And you can't take credit for this; it is a gift from God. ⁹ Salvation is not a reward for the good things we have done, so none of us can boast about it.

We are saved by God's grace when we believe. We cannot boast about receiving it, because we didn't do anything to earn it. It is offered out of God's unconditional love for us.

This is a reminder that you don't have to beg God to like you or to have a relationship with him. He is not tallying how often you fail, nor does he want to shame or punish you when you do. There is no need to avoid him out of fear—because you are already forgiven—and he delights in you when you seek him out to know him more.

Zephaniah 3:17

"For the Lord your God is living among you. He is a mighty savior. He will take delight in you with gladness. With his love, he will calm your fears. He will rejoice over you with joyful songs."

Questions:

Are you suffering from a past shame that is preventing you from seeking out or developing a relationship with God?

Are you still playing the religious game, trying to earn God's favor and avoid his shame? Are you ready and willing to live from God's grace because you believe Jesus is your Lord and Savior?

Next Steps:

Fully accept Jesus as your Lord and Savior, if you haven't already.

Surrender your shame to God in prayer, and ask that he calm your fears.

Do something that gives you delight in God.

Prayer:

Jesus, you are both Lord and Savior. To accept that denies me of my religion. I do not have to live in shame to be in your presence. Let grace abound in me, Lord. I live from your grace, not in trying to earn your favor. Amen.

Adopted Through Grace - Losing My Religion May 8, 2024

What comes to mind when you think of *grace*? It is a word we often hear in church and Christian circles, but many do not fully grasp its meaning. Grace is God's gift of forgiveness, given freely to us through Jesus Christ's sacrifice. His death paid the debt for our sins and laid the foundation for an eternal relationship with God.

Before Jesus, we see humanity needing to offer sacrifices to God to atone for their sins. Jesus was sent as our Savior because God *loved* his creation and knew we could never do enough to earn his favor. God's grace, alone, freed us from our sins and led to him adopting us into his family.

We were created to enjoy an eternal relationship with God, not to religiously follow a set of laws. Yes, there are rules, but they were created—*out of love*—to safeguard us and keep us holy (Exodus 20, Luke 10:26-28).

Think about it this way: As children, our parents established rules, like a curfew, to prevent us from getting hurt. They were created, because of us, to keep us safe. Our parents did not have children for the purpose of fulfilling these rules. Similarly, humans were created for more than obeying God's laws.

Sometimes "religion" overemphasizes rules and can get in the way of us accepting God's grace and pursuing a relationship with him. This does not mean we should do whatever we want because we have grace. Rather, it is relearning why God created us in the first place—out of love.

This grace inspires us to imitate God's love and goodness (Galatians 5:22-23). When we see ourselves as God's children and know that we are safe in his family, it develops our character and creates in us a desire to follow the example Jesus provided. We learn that we will not be kicked out of God's Kingdom, because we have already been forgiven for our mistakes—past, present, and future. Instead, we can learn from them and continue to grow in God's character.

Let us go about our days knowing there is nothing that can separate us from God. We are safe and secure as his sons and daughters forevermore.

Ephesians 5:1:

Imitate God, therefore, in everything you do, because you are his dear children.

Questions:

How can we imitate God's character in daily life?

Why is the gift of grace so significant?

Next Steps:

Make plans to join a Group for the Summer Semester to connect with a like-minded community of Jesus followers who will show you the love and grace of God. The Groups directory will open May 25th.

Consider baptism to declare your faith in Jesus and to publicly show your adoption into God's family.

Prayer:

Heavenly Father, thank you for showing me your grace each day. May I never take your grace for granted. Encourage me to show your love to those around me, and remind me that religion is not about a set of rules to follow. It is about a grace-filled, eternal relationship with you. Help me to exemplify your image and grow in the fruit of the Spirit. In Jesus' name, amen.

I remember running around as fast as I could, picking up all the sticks before my little brother could grab them. I wasn't going to stop until I pleased my dad and earned my money!

Many of us work to gain God's love. However, Jesus paid the price to set us free. He endured the suffering we deserve. He bought the ticket that allows us to be near God. We can do nothing to earn that—it's a free gift.

You see, my dad paid us the same amount because he wanted each of us to do our best and be proud of what we accomplished together. He never expected perfection.

The same is true of our Heavenly Father. God isn't holding eternity over our heads, like a reward for getting things right. Instead, he is calling us into the business of changing lives. There is nothing better than helping someone experience God!

Questions:

When are you tempted to work hard to earn God's grace? What is one thing you can do to pour God's love out to the people around you this week?

Next Steps:

Make a list of people in your life who God is inviting you to love. Write down ways that you can serve them this week: bake them a batch of cookies, invite them out for coffee, or offer to help weed their flower beds.

Go through GrowthTrack and learn about your God-given gifts and passions. Find a place to serve, and watch God use you to make a difference. If you have already gone through GrowthTrack, ask God if there is a different way he wants to use you in this new season of life.

Prayer:

The Best Gift We Can Receive - Losing My Religion

Have you ever unintentionally caused someone pain? I know I have.

I remember back in junior high making a comment to my friend that I thought would get a laugh. It didn't! My "joke" hurt her feelings, and she refused to talk to me for several days. I felt ashamed for what I had done and wrote her a letter, apologizing for my actions. Luckily, she accepted my apology, and we returned to being good friends again.

Prayer:

Dear God, I know I have fallen short at times. It is hard for me to admit it because it can bring shame. It is not easy for me to come to you to ask for your grace. Help me remember that your grace is unconditional, no matter what the circumstances. Show me ways that I can show your grace to others. Amen.
